
Towanda Lions Club

Garden Tips

Hopefully, our cold winter is past. It is tempting to start uncovering the plants, but we can still have some cold weather, so keep the mulch handy to cover up again.

You want to prune the fruit trees, grapes, and raspberries early in the month before the buds swell. When pruning the old fashioned raspberries, remove the stem that had fruit last year. It usually is brown by now. The nice green stems that came up last year will bear fruit this year. The canes of the ever-bearing red raspberries that produced in the fall will also produce the following summer. Wait to remove the canes until after the second crop.

To control iris borer, clean up and destroy the old foliage before new growth appears.

In Ohio, they have discovered that the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB), has spread to the native fringe trees. The EAB usually has been spread by moving firewood from one area to another. It is illegal to move firewood out of or into McLean County and many other counties in the state. If you have any ash wood, be sure to burn it before May 1, when the larvae will hatch into an insect, and start laying eggs.

You may have noticed some bark has been peeled off of your tree branches, especially the maple trees. The squirrels have been gnawing on the branches, especially the maple trees. They are not getting enough nutrients from the bird seeds, so they are going after the rising sap.



It won't be long until the pretty song birds will be returning for the summer. We should do some spring house cleaning for them now. An easy way to clean the bird house is to use a spray bottle to wet the inside. Let it soak for a few minutes and then just scrape out the old nesting materials. Sometimes birds have used the house for shelter during the winter and they did not clean up after themselves.

The birds will need a drink of water, plus a place to bathe. Sprinkle a little sand in the bird bath and scrub it with a clean brush. The grit helps to grind away the residue. It will also need to be cleaned often during the summer so they can always have clean water to drink. You might place a small piece of wood in it so the bees and butterflies can land on it and safely get a drink of water. The bird feeder should be cleaned every season. Use 1 part bleach to 10 parts of water and give it a good scrubbing. Do not use the bleach water to clean the hummingbird feeder. You can place some dry rice or beans with water and gently shake it to reach the hard places.

After a rain, sometimes the bird seeds get wet. Even after it gets dry, the seed could be moldy. Empty it out onto the ground, clean it, and give them fresh food. If we take good care of the birds, we can enjoy watching them, hearing them sing, and best of all they will eat the insects and we won't need to spray any chemicals.



We keep telling people not to use pesticides and insecticides in the garden. Instead, here are some things you might do. Pests usually prey on weak plants, so try to buy healthy plants. The best way to keep them healthy is to start with good soil. Load it with as much compost or organic matter as you can. By doing that, you can eliminate insects and disease in the garden and the healthy soil will have beneficial microbes and contain a balance of minerals. The organic mulch will provide a place for the beneficial predators like beetles, centipedes and spiders to live. Also, choose plants that are disease resistant, native to the area, and will fit into your growing conditions.

Less than one percent of the pest population in the garden are considered pests. Most of them are beneficial and ready to take on the bad bugs. We need the pollinators to fertilize female flowers, so fruit and seed can develop. The bugs, such as ladybugs, ants, beetles, spiders, and many others, are beneficial and feed on the garden pests.

To encourage the helpful insects to visit your garden, you have to stop using pesticides. They kill the good bugs as well as the bad ones. Also we need a variety of different size and color of plants. Also, don't be too tidy with your garden design. A natural garden will provide shelter and nesting place for the birds and other beneficial insects. Allow some plants to go to seed. Leave some debris under the shrubs and perennials. Robins and other birds need insects to feed their babies and a lot of birds need the protein from the insects. The birds also need nesting material from our



It is so good to see and feel the nice warm sun, and it is tempting to get started in the garden. Right now, the soil is too cold for seeds to germinate. If the soil is too cold and wet, they will just sit there and rot. If you are anxious to get started planting, you can plant your Caladium, Dahlia, elephant Ear, and begonias now in a container, and then plant them later in the soil when it warms up. Place the container in a warm, sunny spot.

Remember that if you are planning to dig and plant trees or shrubs, call Julie, 811 before you dig. It is a law. They can tell you if there are any utility wires, cables or pipes in the area. It could also save you time and money.

If you have ordered any new perennials or woody plants, they are usually shipped around the time they should be planted. If the soil is too wet or cold, just repot them into a larger pot and put them in a sheltered location, so they can adjust before planting. Plant them at the same depth as they are in the pot. It is best to plant on a cloudy day or in the early or late part of the day. Avoid planting in the heat of the day. Check the root mass. Any girdling roots should be loosened or scored with a knife to promote new feeder root growth.

Water deeply and infrequently to encourage strong root growth.

New Law Regarding Immunization Requirements

Beginning with the 2015 –2016 school year, Illinois law requires that all students entering 6th and 12th grade MUST have a meningococcal vaccine(MCV).

Unit 5 students in 6th and 12th grades WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO START SCHOOL WITHOUT THIS IMMUNIZATION!

6th graders must receive one dose on or after the 11th birthday

12th graders must receive two doses, the second dose must be after the 16th birthday. If the first dose is received at 16 years of age or older, only 1 dose is required.

Contact your health provider to see if your child has received a meningococcal vaccine or to schedule an appointment. Please provide your school with proof of the immunization once it is completed.
