Indian Creek Fall Work Day - Phase I October 15, 2005

On a beautiful Fall day, October 15th, eight neighborhood volunteers Sue Arnold, Dennis Maze, Jim Russell, Mike Cunningham, Jim Kellenberger, Brian Krause, Herb Todd, and Helen Mogill tackled the first phase of the planned nature area restoration project.

At the main entrance to the Nature Area non-native and invasive species were removed. Overcrowded saplings, shrubs and brush were cleared. Herbicide was applied to the cut stumps to prevent re-growth. The trees that were designated to remain could now been seen clearly and some of them were trimmed for appearance. In addition, the creek edge was cleared along this area to provide a nice view of the creek from the road and from the Nature Area entrance. Several loads of cut material were moved to a new (and now




Welcome New Neighbors!

Flu and Pneumonia Shots



The McLean County Health Department is dispensing flu and pneumonia shots for those over 50 at community clinics during the month of November. Residents under the age of 50 with a chronic disease such as heart, lung or kidney disease; anemia; asthma; or immune system disorder need a signed physician's statement identifying the chronic disease and the recommendation for the flu and/or pneumonia vaccine must be presented at the time vaccination.

Influenza vaccinations are covered under Medicare Part B. Medicare will also pay for pneumonia vaccines for those who have Plan B coverage and who have not received the vaccine in the past. Persons with Medicare coverage must bring their Medicare card at the time of the appointment for billing purposes. A fee of \$30 for the flu vaccine and \$40 for the pneumonia vaccine will be requested from individuals who do not have Medicare coverage. Persons with HMO-type health coverage should contact their health insurance company to determine which providers are covered under their plan.

Appointments must be scheduled to receive a flu or pneumonia shot through the McLean County Health Department. Call **309-888-5397** for an appointment at one of the following clinics:

Flushing



A resident asked: "Could we maybe have a reminder of the scheduled day of the month for hydrant flushing. I know I can no longer remember which day it is."

Answer: Suspended sediment or particulate matter is material that naturally exists in the Indian Creek well water. It concentrates and settles at low points in the system. We usually flush the system on the **3rd Thursday of each month** to correct this problem. If the 3rd Thursday is missed, then the system is flushed on the 4th Thursday.

Sediment is stirred up by an increase in the velocity of the water through system. This can happen due to flushing or peak temporary demands on the system. That is why this seems to be an intermittent problem.

The best action for someone to take to clear increased sediment in their water is to run an outside hose until the water clears up. Keep in mind that if the dirty water has already made it into the house, it may be in the water heater and take a day or two to clear up.
