Pine Wilt Nematode




I suddenly lost a pine tree in my backyard seemingly in just a few months. Then, I noticed that another tree of what appeared to be the same species, in my front yard, very large, was exhibiting symptoms also. I was alarmed since to lose a tree 30+ feet tall is a huge loss to the landscape and a tragedy. I took samples and photos into the University of Illinois extension office. They sent the specimens off to Champaign for testing. I got the results back and no fungus or insect infestation was found. But what they suspected is something I had researched on the internet and hoped was not going to be the prognosis. The likely culprit is something called pine wilt nematode. It is carried by beetles and the tiny worms end up blocking the vascular system of the tree...nutrients can't circulate and the tree dies, usually quickly.

My tree is an Austrian pine. There are other properties in the subdivision that look like they have lost at least one tree with a couple more probably infected. Driving on county highway 29, you can see the same type of tree that people have bordering their yards on the west side toward the road, and there are more dead there. There is no treatment. To reduce the chances of infection of other

trees, the recommendation is to cut down and remove infected trees and either bury them or burn them.

Not every tree that gets pine wilt nematode will die. Some trees can get infected and survive.

Panel Discussion: Small Business Can Go Green To Save Green

The Ecology Action Center in Normal invites local small business owners to participate in their first "Sustainable Solutions for Small Businesses" discussion panel on Friday, August 5th at Heartland Bank, 200 W. College Avenue in Normal.

"Sustainable Solutions for Small Businesses" is an opportunity for business owners to share ideas about applying green practices to everyday objectives without affecting their bottom-line. The panel will feature business owners from the Bloomington-Normal area as well as representatives from the Illinois Green Business Association and the Ecology Action Center.

"While we know that businesses need to look out for their bottom line," said Michael Brown, Executive Director of the Ecology Action Center, "there is an intersection where what's good for the environment is also good for business."

The event will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. in Heartland Bank's Community Room. Interested participants are asked to sign up by July 29, 2011. August Rain Barrel and Composter Workshops Scheduled

The Ecology Action Center wants to help Bloomington-Normal area residents conserve water, reduce stormwater runoff pollution, and reduce waste going to the landfill. To meet these goals, the EAC has scheduled low-cost workshops where residents will learn about these issues in detail and build their own rain barrel or composter that they can take home and put to immediate use. The workshops are a very cost-effective alternative to buying a ready-to-use rain barrel and include all materials, tools, and instruction needed to successfully build a 55- gallon rain barrel for home use. The rain barrel design includes screens to prevent mosquito entry and an overflow hose to direct extra water away from the house foundation and into the yard.

Backyard composting is the easiest way to reduce waste from home and create rich soil nutrients to feed one's garden at the same time. The composter workshops will include everything needed to successfully begin home composting. Various types of compost systems and techniques will be discussed in addition to troubleshooting tips to avoid potential problems. In addition, each workshop will include a discussion on vermicomposting, or composting with worms. Participants will make and take home two 32-gallon composters ready for use and receive a kitchen compost pail.

Rain Barrel workshops are scheduled for August 9 at 5:30 p.m. and August 13 at 10 a.m. The composting workshop is scheduled for August 11 at 5:30 p.m. Workshop space is limited and pre-registration is required; online registration or downloadable registration forms are available at

www.ecologyactioncenter.org on the BN Green Events Calendar or by stopping by the Ecology Action Center at 202 West College in Normal during regular business hours. Confirmation of registration and workshop location details and will be provided after payment and registration form are received. The Ecology Action Center is the primary resource for environmental education, information, and outreach in McLean County. The EAC educates for environmental action at a walk-in information center and through educational programs on a variety of environmental topics.

The Towanda Baptist Church is sponsoring a Blood Drive on Wednesday, Aug. 24, at the Towanda Community Building from 3-7. Donation appointments can be scheduled between 3:00 PM and 6:45 PM. A blood donation takes approximately 45-60 minutes. Eligible donors must be in good health; feel well the day of the donation; weigh between 110-350 lbs., be at least 17 years old (16 year olds may donate in Illinois with the approved consent form signed by a parent); have vital signs within criteria.

Remember to bring IDENTIFICATION or your Red Cross donor card so you can donate!

Every two seconds, someone in this country needs blood. There is fewer than ten percent of the eligible population actually donating each year. There are 10-12 pints in our bodies and a single pint can help save three lives. As an added incentive, between May 16 and September 7, 2011 all presenting donors (ages 21 and older) will have a chance to win a trip for four to Orlando, FL. All presenting donors of all ages are eligible to win other fun summer prizes.
