Gardening Tips

Continue to harvest your vegetables, fruit and herbs often. Picking them encourages the plants to produce more and it decreases the insects and diseases. Some of the vegetables have better flavor when they are smaller.

It is time to stop fertilizing and pruning the trees and shrubs. When you fertilize them they tend to send up new shoots. The new shoots will not have time to grow and mature enough for the winter cold. You can give the roses their final fertilizer by the end of July. You can use a liquid 20-20-20 fertilizer.

Remove the spent flowers or seed heads of day lilies, so they can save their energy for next year. You can cut and remove old fruiting canes of raspberries after harvest. Usually the older canes will turn brown.

Try to control the weeds from going to seed, If you can't remove the weeds, at least cut off the seed head for fewer weeds next year.

Water deeply and less frequently to promote deeper, more drought-resistant plants. It is mosquito time of the year and we are hearing a lot about the fear of the mosquito-borne Zika virus. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in June 2016 there were more than 750 confirmed cases of Zika in the United States. But no Zika-carrying mosquitoes had been detected in the United States. The victims got the disease elsewhere and brought it back home. Officials are warning that as more travelors return there is a good chance of more spreading of it.

In many places of the world it has shown they are spraying pesticides to kill the mosquitoes. In the past, places have sprayed in the U.S., but it had shown that spraying doesn't work that well, because it also kills pollinators as well as the insects that are food for fish, birds and other wildlife. Spraying may worsen the mosquito problem because the insects are getting resistant to the pesticide and it is killing the enemies to them, upsetting the ecosystems.

They have found the best way is to eliminate mosquitoes breeding sites and to protect yourself with clothing and repellants. The mosquitoes can lay eggs in small amounts of stagnant water, including gutters, children's toys, plant saucers and bottle caps. Get rid of those things or be sure to empty them after a rain. If you can't get rid of the water, such as water gardens or a pond, treat it with a larvaecide, such as natural soil bacterium, also called mosquito dunk.

Change water in bird baths every few days. Add a pump or fountain for back yard pond. Adult mosquitoes and larve are on the menu for a lot of wildlife, from birds and bats, frogs, lizards and dragonflies. Take steps to support the wildlife,

Wear long sleeves and long pants when you go outside. ""Also use insect repellants containing deet, picardin or lemon Eucalyptus.

We propagate soft stemmed plants, you can also propagate woody ornamentals such as roses, holly, etc.. Sometimes we want to share or add another shrub, that we really like, but can't find one like the one you have. You can do it by "rock rooting" in mid summer, officially known as layering.

Some plants do better on old wood, and some do better on new wood,. Some people think roots seem to form better near the junction between new and old wood. Find a low branch of the plant you want to duplicate, Strip the leaves from the part of the stem that will be placed under

ground. Slightly injure the bottom part of the section that will be underground with a pocket knife, in 2 or 3 places. Be careful not to cut through it. You can omit that part if you are uncomfortable doing it.

Put the wounded stem In a trench about 2 - 3 inches deep. Cover it with some rich soil, leaving a light depression to allow water to collect. Place a heavy rock or brick over the springest part to keep it in place. Also place another rock where the stem comes out of the trench to direct the plant to grow in a vertical pattern. Keep the soil moist to encourage the root growth.

It should be well rooted by the end of September. Gently tug on what will be the new plant. if there is resistance, there should be well-formed roots. Over winter, protect it with a bit of mulch.

In the spring, snip the rooted end and carefully move it to a pot. Baby it for about a month and then it can be planted in the ground.
