

Labor Day is the start of the new lawn care year. Early this month is the best time to seed or reseed your lawn. When starting a new patch of grass, be sure the seed has good contact with the soil. It doesn't hurt if you walk on it to press the seed down. Water it and lightly cover it with clean straw which will help hold the moisture. Be sure to keep the soil moist.

Now is also a good time to plant trees, shrubs, and perennials. The garden centers have them on sale, so they don't have to over winter them. By planting

them now, they can put their energy into growing a good root system before the ground freezes. Be sure to water them weekly as needed. When you plant, make the hole twice as wide as the root ball. The root flare of tree trunks should be above ground. Don't dig the hole too deep.

The chrysanthemums are pretty and will bring color to the garden. When choosing a plant, try to find one that has only part of the flowers open, that way you can enjoy flowers longer.

You can cut off your peonies now. Be sure to destroy the tops so they don't leave any disease. You can cut them back to about 2 inches. It is also time to divide or transplant them. You can dig the whole plant and divide it or just dig out part of the plant. When planting it, be sure it is in full sun. Also it is important not to plant it too deep. The pink eyes, next years stems, should not be more than 2 inches below the top of the soil. They won't bloom if planted too deep or in the shade.



The spring blooming bulbs are in the stores now. If you are looking for a certain kind, now is the time to purchase them while the supplies are available. It is to early to plant them, so store them in a cool, dark place. After the soil has cooled in late October or early November, plant them with the pointed side up. For some bulbs, it is hard to tell which end is up, so lay it on its side. You can also divide your daffodils and tulips now.

If you have a problem with the squirrels digging the bulbs up, place 3-5 bulbs in a metal suet holder and bury it. Also the deer like to eat the tulips in the spring, but they don't like the daffodils.

With all the rain we've been having, the grass and weeds have really been growing. Creeping Charlie has also been growing. If you have been spraying it, now is the time for the fall application. With the rain, the ground is soft and you can pull it rather easy. Just try to get a hold of it where it is growing in the ground and pull it. It sends out runners in several directions. When pulling on the plant, you could have 4 or 5 runners about 3 feet long. If left in the ground each leaf node would send down roots, making a lot of new plants. You can easily find the stems along a side walk, just push your finger under them and pull up.

Some garden centers have marked down perennials that have finished blooming. They may not look good now, but get them planted now and remove the spent flowers. After the ground freezes, mulch them and next year, you could have some inexpensive flowers.



The trees are starting to drop their leaves and some say they are a gift from Mother Nature. In the spring when they leaf out on the trees, they tell us that warmer weather is on it's way. They get busy right away cleaning the air by absorbing the pollution in the air and returning it as oxygen. They even block some of the noise and release moisture into the air.

Now that the leaves are falling they turn into a kind of slow release fertilizer, that with a little processing can be a great amendment to even the poorest of soils. A light

layer of leaves can easily be mowed, broken into smaller pieces and left on the ground to feed the earthworms. They will return it in rich castings into the soil.

If you have a lot of leaves and you think it will smother the grass, bag some and save them for next year. Or you can spread it as mulch around the trees and shrubs. You can also spread it on the garden and work it into the soil. You can put it 4-6 inches deep. You can also water it to keep it from blowing away.

When the leaves blow in around the shrubs and perennials, leave them alone as they make good mulch to protect their roots. It will also be a good place for insects to lay their eggs. The eggs will hatch next spring and provide food for the birds. The birds need the insects and larva to feed their young. They need thousands of larvae to feed a family of young birds. We like to see and hear the birds.

We'll begin the study on Thursday, October 20 at 10:00 AM to 11:30 AM at the home of Judy Schulthes, 16 Bent Tree Lane.


Plans are to meet at this time every other Thursday and completing the study by April 20 at the latest. Judy and Kay Liebenow will host the Bible Study in their homes.
