Towanda Fire Department



TFD closed out its 2017 year on November 30th. TFD had 165 calls for the year, with 53.99% of our calls being medical calls. Members of the Towanda Fire Department participated in 113 different training opportunities. TFD firefighters logged roughly 2800 hours between fire calls and training meetings. This averages out to about 140 dedicated hours per firefighter. During 2017 TFD took possession of a new 2017 Ford F250 pickup truck. This vehicle replaces a 2003 Tahoe with over 100,000 miles on it and will be used as a second response vehicle for medicals. TFD also placed an order for a new engine, a new fire truck body will be placed on a used Spartan

chassis with less than 500 hours on it. By purchasing this used chassis, TFD saved over \$113,000.00 dollars over the purchase of a new chassis. This new engine will replace a 25 year old fire truck. The new Engine 61 is scheduled for

mid-summer 2018 delivery.

It won't be long until some people will be wanting to find a new home for that precut Christmas tree. One thing you could do is place it near the bird feeder for temporary shelter for the birds. Place it at least 10 feet from the feeders so the predators won't be tempted to hang around.

You can place a rebar stake into the ground and stand the tree on it. Or you can drive a stake or fence post into the ground and then fasten the trunk of the tree to the post with a bungee cord. That way the birds will have food and shelter all winter. It can also add interest to the back yard.

We have been having a lot of wind that can pull moisture out of the soil, trees, and newly planted shrubs. Don't forget to water them deeply. You can poke a small hole in the bottom of a 5 gallon bucket and fill it with water. The hole will let the water out slowly so it can soak into the soil.

To grow rosemary indoors, place the plant in a cool, bright spot. Do not let the soil get dry, keep it moist, but not soggy.

When purchasing de-icing material, try to get some containing calcium, magnesium. or potassium chloride listed to use on walkways, rather than sodium based. Those products are more friendly to lawn grass and other plants in the garden.

If you have branches damaged by snow and ice, you should prune them right away.

When shopping for shut-ins at home or in assisted living, Norfolk Pine trees make a small Christmas tree. Amaryllis bulbs are fun to watch grow. They grow very fast. The flowers are very attractive and last awhile. African violets make nice plants for year round beauty.

The orchids that we see in the stores now usually hold their flowers for a long time. Just give them light and keep the potting mix moist. It would also help to place the pot on a shallow dish of water with pebbles for humidity.

Watering is the key element to house plants. Over watering kills more plants than under watering. Most plants like for the top of the soil to dry before watering again. A lot of plants are resting during the short day light hours and don't use a lot of water and fertilizer. Lift the container, if it is light, water it. If it still feels heavy, the soil is still moist.

When it snows, you want to avoid burying trees and shrubs when removing snow from the sidewalk and driveway. Be careful if you use a melting agent, many of them contain salts that can damage plants, lawns and concrete.

Be sure the root zones of Azaleas and rhododendrons are thoroughly mulched. Also after the ground freezes, mulch the base of rose plants deeply to keep the soil temperature more even.
