#### **Gardening Tips**

It won't be long until people will be getting ready to start their seeds. One of the first things you need to do is check your seeds left from last year for germination.

Take a moist paper towel and scatter 10 seeds on it. Cover it with another moist paper towel. Roll it up and place it in a plastic bag so it stays moist. Be sure to mark it as to what kind of seeds are in it. Place it on the counter.

Several days later, you can check to see how many seeds have started to germinate. It can take a while because some seeds germinate faster than others. Be sure to keep the paper towels moist all of the time.

If more than 50 percent of the seeds germinate, you can use them this year. You might want to plant them a little thicker if need be.

If less than 50 percent of the seeds germinate, it is time to get new seeds.

The daylight hours are getting longer, making people feel better. The houseplants are also waking up from their winter nap. A little more sunshine would make it a lot better. As soon as you see new growth, or around Valentine's Day, you can start fertilizing again. some companies say to fertilize once a month and others say you can fertilize every time you water. As always follow the directions on the container.

More plants are killed by over watering. Check to see if the soil is dry or if the container feels lightweight before you water.

If you stored your mandavilla over winter, now is the time to prune it back.

Now is the time to start your tuberous begonias. They are very slow coming up.

Grapevines can be pruned in late February or March. Remember, they produce ono new wood.

If you haven't started your lawn mower or if you get it checked every year, now is the time to get busy. Don't wait until the last minute when the shops are all booked up.
