

One bird which was conspicuously absent from this years count was the brown creeper, which in years past has always been there. The barred owl was a very nice bonus as were the two Carolina wrens. One member of our group reported seeing a red fox in the common ground area.

Now that you have finished digging in the garden you can clean the dried mud off of your garden tools. Also, wipe them with an oily cloth so that they don't rust. Also if you are finished with your mower and other power equipment they should also be winterized. Change the oil and lubricate the moving parts. Either drain the fuel or mix gas stabilizing additive into the gas tank. You could let it run until it is out of gas.

If the ground isn't frozen, water your evergreen trees and shrubs deeply. They lose water through their needles all winter long.

If you have problems with rabbits chewing on shrubs during winter, place a fence around them. Remember when the ground is covered with snow they look for food above ground.

As I look out my back door, everything looks dead. I have not cut any of the pretty perennials off and the leaves have blown up around them. What I don't see is all of the future insects snuggled under the leaves, tree bark, downed logs, soil, and dried seed heads.

The beetles. spiders, slugs, etc. depending on the ground cover though out the winter. Many small insects go into a hibernation-like state and lay dormant until spring. Moths and others might lay their eggs on the leaves. The leaves fall to the ground and pupate into cocoons, emerging as adults in the spring.

Backyard mammals also tend to hibernate. Chipmunks, voles and other small rodents find space in open logs and cover themselves with plant material. Ground hogs and foxes build burrows and rarely move for months. For some, their body produces a type of anti-freeze to protect them from the freezing cold. Of course, when the snow falls, that also helps to insulate them from the cold.

Let a corner of your yard be as natural as possible so the birds will have some insects to eat next spring. We need the birds and insects.

If you have received a plant as a gift or purchased one at a store and it is in a foil wrapping, you don't want the plant to be sitting in water. You can remove the foil wrapping, but sometimes that takes away part of the beauty of the plant. Or, you can remove the wrapping, punch holes in the bottom so excess water can drain out. Then replace the wrapping and be sure to place the plant in a saucer to catch the excess water. Don't want to damage the table.

When purchasing de-icing products for sidewalks, use calcium, magnesium, or potassium chloride-based products. They are more friendly to the lawn grass and other plants than the sodium-based ones.
