Gardening Tips

The daylight hours are getting longer and the house plants will soon be waking up from their winter rest. Just like the furniture collects dust, so do the plant's leaves. Using a wet paper towel or cloth, hold your hand under the leaf and gently wipe the top off.

While you are cleaning the plants, check for insects. If you notice the leaves or the table has something sticky on it, you have a problem. If there are little green insects on the tender tips of the plant, it could be aphids. Ladybugs like to eat them. If the plant was outside, a strong blast of water would knock them off, If inside, spray with insecticidal soap.

If you see what looks like little pieces of cotton, it could be mealy bugs. You can dip a cotton ball in alcohol and dab on them or spray with insecticidal soap.

Another common insect is scale. It is usually found on the trunk of the plant and looks like brown circles. You can scrap them off or better to spray it with insecticidal soap.

Once you have a problem with the insects, you should spray every 5-7 days for 4 weeks. The first time you spray to kill the original insects. The next time you spray to kill the eggs that have hatched and you want to kill them before they get old enough to lay eggs, Then spray again to just be sure that you got all of them.

It is the middle of February and the plants are starting to show some new growth, so it is time to start fertilizing again. As always, follow the directions on the container.

In the last few years, we have seen a big drop in the number of birds that we see. In the spring, we used to see a big flock of robins, now we only see a few. Birds are an important part of the ecosystem. The ecosystem is a system made up of a community of animals, plants, insects, bacteria and the environment with which its integrated. It is important to protect each link in the chain to help the other links.

It is believed that the overuse of pesticides could be a big danger to the birds. Birds need to eat and feed their young insects. When they eat insects that have died from pesticides, the pesticide can build up in their bodies and make them sick and die.

Most of the insects are good bugs because they will eat or destroy other insects or like the pollinators that have a job to do. The spider spins a web to catch its food and the hummingbird uses the web to wrap around its nest to hold it together when it stretches as the babies grow. They also used the dandelion seeds to line their nest. Dandelions have pretty flowers and they provide food in early spring when the honeybees first come out and their roots go deep into the ground to break up the soil.

People are finding out the grain seed that has been coated before planting can make the birds sick and die when they eat it off of the ground.

As always follow the directions on the container when using pesticides.

As I am writing this the ground is covered with snow, but I know that spring is on the way. The daylight hours are getting longer, the birds are singing in the morning and the lilac leaf buds are getting pretty green.

It is time to make sure that you have everything ready if you plan to start your own seeds. If not, you have time to clean your containers with one part bleach and nine parts water. Check your light bulbs. You can use shop lights instead of expensive grow light bulbs. Just be sure to keep them the right distance from the plants. Follow the directions on the seed packet as to when to start them.

Also, check your garden tools to see if they need to be cleaned, repaired or replaced. Every time that you use your pruners, they seem to collect some sticky stuff that collects on the blades. You can take the pruners apart to give them a good cleaning. Just put the parts in a row so you can remember how to put them back together. If the nuts have rusted, place the blade end in a glass of vinegar to remove the rust. Clean the pruners well with soap and warm water. Dry them good and wipe the blade with a rag with WD40.

Also, sharpen the blades to your pruners and loppers. Clean and sharpen the trowel and spades. Clean sharp tools are much easier to use than dull ones with caked-on mud.

Also, get your mower to the shop for checkup and blades sharpened.

The bright sunshiny days make us want to get out in the yard and get busy. It is too early to uncover anything now because we can still have some cold winter days.

It is time to prune the grapes. Remember, they bloom and bare on new wood. Also, check frost heaving perennials like strawberries and corral bells. You might need to push them back down into the soil and add more mulch over them.

Check your tubers and bulbs that you stored for over the winter to see if any have started to sprout. If they have you can pot them and keep them in a bright sunny location and plant them outside after the danger of frost has passed.

Dormant soil spray breaks the life cycle of insects without the use of pesticides. You can use it on many ornamental and fruit trees. Use it before the leaf comes out and when the temperature is above 40 degrees. As always, follow the directions on the container.

It is time to start your tuberous begonias. It is also time to prune the fruit trees. Be sure to sterilize the tools after each cut so that you don't spread disease.

Get your cold frame ready and you can plant a row of lettuce for early garden-fresh greens. If you add some compost to the cold frame, it could add some heat as it breaks down.

You can rejuvenate shrubs now such as spiraea, honeysuckle, and privet by cutting the stems down to 4-6 inches from the ground.
