Gardening Tips

Autumn has arrived and it is time to bring those houseplants back inside. The Christmas cactus likes to stay out until the last one when it gets down to the low '50s at night. The Amaryllis should already be down for its nap. Before you bring your houseplants in, you should give them a good blast from the garden hose to remove all of the dust and pollen from the outside air.

Next, check the drain hole on the bottom. If the roots are growing out, it should be repotted. For some plants, you can just remove about an inch of soil and roots from the bottom and repot in the same container. If you need to place it in a larger container, only go up one size container.

Also, check the plant good for disease and insects

Last, but not least is to check the sides of the container and the bottom for insect nests. Spiders like to have a nest on the bottom.

Some plants will drop some leaves because of the change in light and humidity, but that is normal and they will grow new leaves.

Now is the time to remove the peony stems. You can cut them back to the ground. Do not put them in the compost pile if they have any sign of disease. If you notice an open space in the center of the plant, it is time to divide the plant.

Dig the plant up and divide the plant so that you have at least 3-5 eyes in each division. the eyes are the little pink new growth. Replant in full sun and so the eyes are no deeper than 2 inches. If they are planted too deep, they might not bloom. It is also a good time to plant new peonies. The tree peony does not need to be divided now.

You can bring your "summered" houseplants in before the temperatures drop below 50 degrees at night. Be sure to check for insect and disease problems. Also, rinse the leaves before bringing them in. Be sure to check the sides and bottom of the container for insect nests. Water the evergreens so they can be well hydrated for the winter winds.

We are hearing a lot about climate change and feeling some of the problems. It has been suggested as one way to make a difference as a gardener, could be to do cardboard gardening. This could save a lot of work and time by not having to till or hoe the garden. It could also help save money by not having to apply fertilizer or weed killer. When you till the soil, you bring up weed seeds and it disturbs the soil life.

One method would be to place large sheets of cardboard on the weedy ground that has been soaked with water, then dig holes about a foot in diameter. Fill them with well-aged compost and plant the tomatoes.

Another method would be to place compost directly on the untilled ground, lay cardboard over it, and soak it with water to soften it. Then cover it with well-aged wood chip mulch. You can poke holes about 2 inches in diameter to plant seedlings.

The third method would be to wet the ground, place the cardboard on the untilled ground, wet the cardboard, cover it with aged compost and sow your seeds.

While the plants are growing, the worms are eating the cardboard and breaking it down and leaving their carbon-rich castings in the soil while also turning and aerating the soil. The best food for plants is worm poop. You leave the cardboard on the ground all winter and the next year you start all over. For perennials, you can patch cardboard around them.

You could end up with some very rich soil.

It is time to start tidying up the garden and get it ready for its long winter nap. If your plants don't have a disease, you can leave them in place. The stems will collect leaves and snow to protect their crown and roots over the winter. They will also give you winter interest and a place for the winter wildlife to use., like the eggs the good insects have laid on the stems that will hatch next spring.

In your vegetable garden, if you don't have time or the energy to remove all of the weeds, at least remove the seed head and put it in the garbage. That will help prevent some of the weeds next year. You can sow winter rye as a cover crop for the winter now.

The leaves are starting to fall, mow over them to shred them and leave them on the ground so they can break down and become fertilizer or you can spread them on the garden.

Water Hydrant Flushing Schedule – 2021

The six water hydrants located in Indian Creek subdivision will be flushed on the dates listed below. Water hydrants are flushed in order to reduce the build-up of sediments in our water system. This is an important process for improving water quality. Our water operator will flush one hydrant at a time and allow it to run for 10-15 minutes (the next in line hydrant is opened concurrently for a brief period to keep water flowing through the system). Water pressure in our system's lines is maintained by the 35,000 gallons of water in our tower, however, pressure in home lines will be reduced during flushing much like when multiple faucets are opened in your homes. Flushing the hydrants will also stir up sediments so please follow the procedures listed below:

- Do not run water during the flushing time period.
- Following flushing, run water through faucets until clear. We recommend this be done by-passing any treatment/filtering system in your home because of the increased sediment stirred up during the flushing process.

Please mark your calendars with the dates listed below. Flushing will be done between 5:00 a.m. and 6:30 a.m. weather permitting. Hydrants will not be flushed in freezing conditions or other inclement weather.

Saturday, October 23

No flushing in November

Wednesday, December 22

Summer Lawn Watering

Please follow our recommended summer watering schedule by only watering on even or odd days corresponding to your street address number and limit watering to 3-4 hours. This will help ensure our well pump can replace water being used in our tower. Summer water usage typically is much higher than the rest of the year and can strain our water system capabilities.
