The Trees of Indian Creek – Maple

Trees are the “lungs of the earth” – leafy organisms that produce the oxygen we breathe in and recycle the carbon dioxide we breathe out. And not only do trees clean the air we breathe, there is also evidence that spending time in the woods is calming and can be therapeutic. In fact, in some countries, it is not uncommon for doctors to prescribe time in the woods for their patients. We are very fortunate, in Indian Creek, to live surrounded by trees.

Among the many species in our woods is the maple tree, whose scientific name is *Acer*. Maple trees are the most common tree in the United States. There are over 130 different species of Maple, of which 13 are native to North America. Most of the maples in our woods are either Sugar Maples or Silver Maples, although Red Maples, Norway Maples, Japanese Maples, and the Autumn Blaze can be seen in the subdivision. Maple trees are easy to recognize because they have a distinctive leaf, and a seed that twirls in the wind like a helicopter when it falls.



In the spring, the Red Maple is one of the first trees to bud, producing a red flower, that is either male or female. In autumn, the maple leaves add yellow, orange, and red to our fall colors.



Maples are fast growing trees. The wood is commonly used in furniture making and flooring.

Maple is also considered a tonewood, which means that it carries sound waves well. Violins, violas, cellos, and double basses all have components made from maple. Drums and some woodwind instruments (like the bassoon) are made from maple. The necks on guitars and electric guitar bodies are often made using maple.

Maple trees are an important source of pollen for honeybees as they are waking up from hibernation in early spring.

But maple trees are probably most famous as the source for producing maple syrup. The Algonquian tribes of the northwestern United States and western Canada developed the art of processing maple sap into maple sugar, maple syrup, and taffy candy. Thank you! A maple tree must be around 30 years old before it is tapped for its sap. It takes between 40-50 gallons of sap to produce 1 gallon of syrup. Harvesting the maple tree's sap for syrup does not harm the tree.

Finally, for you whiskey drinkers, the charcoal made from maple trees is required in the making of Tennessee whiskey (like Jack Daniels) using the Lincoln County Process (the technique used for almost all Tennessee whiskey).

The next time you are waking the woods, take time to admire the grove of old maples. Find them by walking to the end of the gravel walking path (located near the bridge) and then turning left into the big open field.

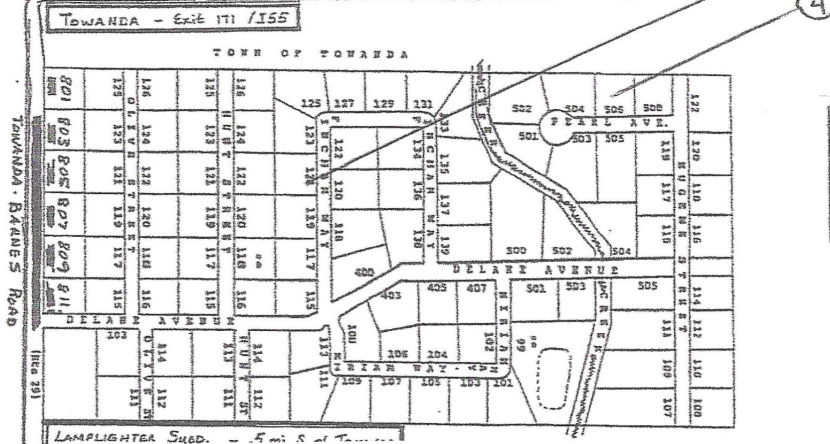
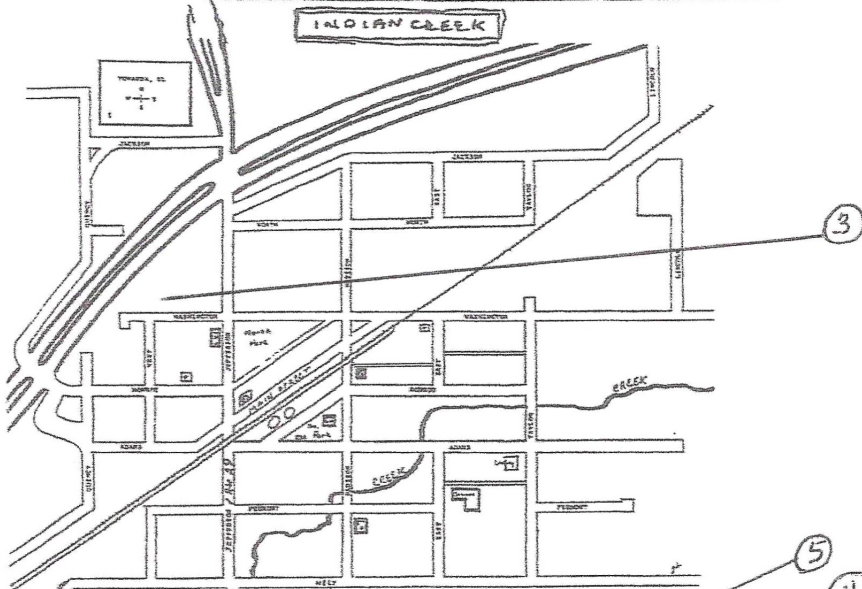
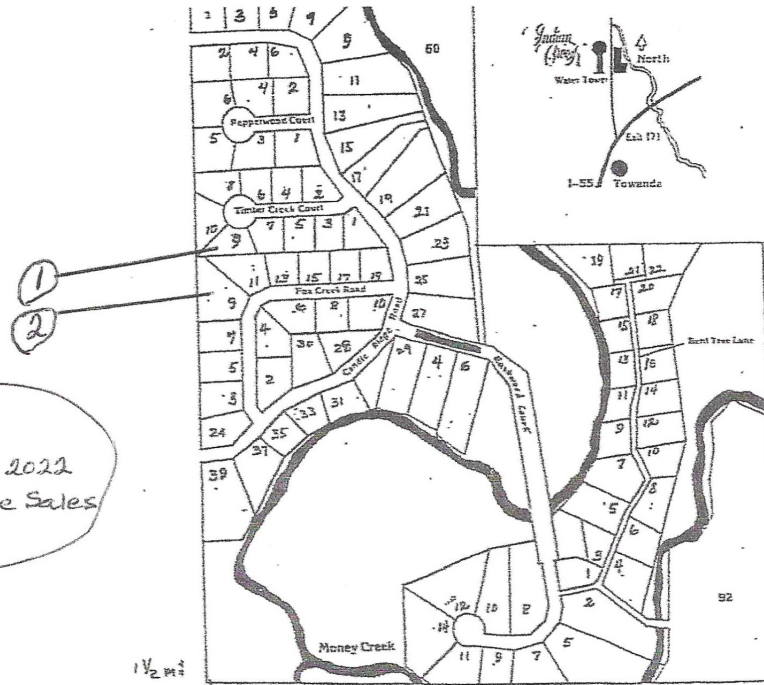

Water Hydrant Flushing Schedule – 2022

The six water hydrants located in Indian Creek subdivision will be flushed on the dates listed below. Water hydrants are flushed in order to reduce the build-up of sediments in our water system. This is an important process for improving water quality. Our water operator will flush one hydrant at a time and allow it to run for 10-15 minutes (the next in line hydrant is opened concurrently for a brief period to keep water flowing through the system). Water pressure in our system's lines is maintained by the 35,000 gallons of water in our tower, however, pressure in home lines will be reduced during flushing much like when multiple faucets are opened in your homes. Flushing the hydrants will also stir up sediments so please follow the procedures listed below:

- Do not run water during the flushing time period.
- Following flushing, run water through faucets until clear. We recommend this be done by-passing any treatment/filtering system in your home because of the increased sediment stirred up during the flushing process.

Please mark your calendars with the dates listed below. Flushing will be done between 5:30 a.m. and 6:30 a.m. weather permitting. **Hydrants will not be flushed in freezing conditions or other inclement weather.**
